**Campus Covid-19 News:** A new Covid-19 testing and travel compliance campaign launched this week for our students in residence: **Test Lion Test.** In addition to our regular weekly email outreach, we kicked



things off with events in the residence halls featuring newly designed postcards and stickers. There will also be new flatscreen content, social media posts and a new website to provide links to critical information and assist students with mandatory twice-weekly testing and travel compliance.

The Berick Center for Student Advising has hit the ground running in 2021; we've been as busy as ever helping CC and SEAS undergraduates navigate their (still predominantly virtual) lives at Columbia. CSA advisers hold regular meetings by phone and webcam to help students plan their academic programs, determine their majors, gear up for life after Columbia and maintain balance and wellness during these unusual times. The pandemic has also facilitated a few innovations this spring: A new electronic system for petitions has streamlined the process of reviewing student requests for exceptions to various academic policies. The degree application process for graduating seniors has also been moved online, and a virtual "Degree Day" event is in the works. The CSA has also been able to do business traditionally since the fall term: Six CSA staff members have been working in the 403 Lerner student hub (along with College staff from other units), where they are available to safely consult with students face-to-face.

**The Center for Career Education** saw a high level of interest in career counseling sessions in the Fall term. Career counselors worked with students in more than

1,100 one-on-one career counseling sessions — a 33% increase from Fall 2019. The CCE team also redesigned 15-minute virtual drop-in sessions that allow students to easily access our services.

CCE launched several new virtual programs including "Networking from Home," a panel and group networking series where students connected with alumni and employer representatives around industries of interest. Career fairs were shifted onto the virtual networking platform Brazen, which put employers and students into one-on-one recruiting conversations; over 1,400 of these chats took place at the 2020 Virtual Undergraduate Career Fair. Career Exploration October also offered a line-up of skill-building programs that covered timely career-related topics such as virtual networking and exploring graduate school (recordings of these can be found in CCE's blog, In the Know).

In all, CCE served 3,600 student attendees at virtual recruiting, networking and skill-building workshops. Programming will continue throughout the Spring term, with additional focus on our Spring Virtual Internship Program and encouragement for students to apply for the Summer Navab Fellowship Program.
