MAJOR IN FILM & MEDIA STUDIES @ COLUMBIA

Why should I major in Film & Media Studies?

Because you want to learn more about the art form, the technology to cultural significance; want to work in the film industry; are looking for a major that combines arts and humanities; want a writing intensive major.

What are some useful first courses?

Introduction to Film and Media Studies (UN1000) is offered every term, including summer session, and should be taken first (preferably freshman year). Other introductorylevel courses are <u>Cinema History 2: 1930-60</u> (UN2020), <u>Cinema History 3:1960-90</u> (UN2030), and <u>Cinema History 4: after 1990</u> (UN2040).

What are the major requirements?

36 points that take the form of introductory lecture courses, followed by intermediatelevel lecture courses and seminars, capped by laboratories in screenwriting and filmmaking, as well as the Senior Seminars. Seven electives are included among the 12 required courses.

Who do I speak to?

The main advisor is Rob King, Director of the Undergraduate Film & Media Studies Program, <u>rk2704@columbia.edu</u>.

When should I declare?

Generally, the second term of sophomore year.

Can I study abroad?

It can be integrated into the Film & Media Studies major, but may interrupt the structure of the Columbia Film classes.

What is a sample course of study?

As long as you take the 5 required courses in the major, you can plan the remaining 7 courses around your interests in consultation with your advisor. Introduction to Film and Media Studies (UN1000) is the only prerequisite for most more advanced courses.

Are there Departmental Honors?

Students pursuing honors certification must take the Senior Seminar in Film Studies. Generally, a 3.75 GPA in the major and distinction in one's overall achievements vis-àvis film and media studies.

Awards and prizes?

In addition to a small number of awards for Screenwriting and Film Criticism, Film majors are also eligible for the Sudler Prize, awarded to a CC senior in the arts.

Student Clubs?

CUFP (Columbia Undergraduate Film Productions) is an active student-run organization that provides filmmaking experience to Columbia producers and directors. For more information, please visit the Office of Student Affairs at your school.

Career opportunities?

Besides screenwriting, directing and producing, alumni work in film distribution, publicity, archives, festivals, and often attend graduate school to become teachers and scholars.
